Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• (GOV/COM.8/OR.152 – Para 30) The representative of CUBA, speaking on behalf of NAM, said that, in the final document of the Ministerial Meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement held in Tehran from 27 to 30 July 2008, the ministers had — inter alia — reaffirmed the inalienable right of developing countries to engage in “research, production and use of atomic energy for peaceful purposes, without any discrimination” and had stressed the responsibility of developed countries to promote the legitimate utilization of nuclear energy in developing countries by allowing them to participate as much as possible in the transfer of nuclear equipment and materials and scientific and technological information for peaceful purposes. Also, the ministers had expressed their full confidence in the impartiality and professionalism of the Agency’s Secretariat and had strongly rejected attempts by any Member State to politicize the work of the Agency, including its technical co-operation programmes, in violation of the Statute.</li><li>• (GOV/COM.8/OR.152 – Para 31) NAM considered especially relevant the guiding principles contained in document INFCIRC/267, which established that the Agency’s technical cooperation activities should facilitate the free access of Member States to the peaceful uses of atomic energy, the transfer of nuclear technology, the development of research, the application and utilization of atomic energy for peaceful purposes in Member States and the promotion of cooperation between them for that purpose. Also, NAM attached great importance to Article III.C of the Statute, which stated that, in carrying out its functions, the Agency “shall not make assistance to members subject to any political, economic, military, or other conditions in compatible with the provisions of this Statute” — a principle that was appropriately reflected in document INFCIRC/267.</li><li>• (GOV/COM.8/OR.152 – Para 32) In that connection, NAM continued to believe that TACC should be kept free of politics and that its recommendations should be based on purely technical and financial considerations.
